Our Walk in Faith ...

When Pastor asked if either Ben or I would be willing to share our individual "Walk in Faith", we told him we would try. I thought I would help Ben with his since he doesn't like to write. AND we did honestly try! Since we didn't want to disappoint Pastor and certainly didn't want to tell him we had NO "Walk in Faith", we decided to approach it from a different angle. We decided to share OUR "Walk in Faith" that we started together, in 1992.

Ben came to this union from a firm Lutheran Christian upbringing. He had suffered the loss of his beloved wife Barbara, of 29 years, from cancer, three years earlier. He had three sons, two of which were married and one who remained unmarried and was still coming to terms with the loss of his mother.

I came to the union from an early Catholic upbringing. But due to a divorce in 1968, I had left my Catholic roots, so that my three children (a daughter and two sons) could have a firm Christian upbringing, without the shadow of my divorce coloring their chances of being accepted. My second husband, Leon, of 17 years, had died of cancer six years earlier. My children were married and I had three grandchildren. Ben had

no grandchildren at that time.

So this union brought together two families that wanted their parents to be happy!! Although none of our six children ever expressed to us any objection to having one big group get together, we pondered if they were really emotionally ready to welcome new people into their circle of FAMILY. We sensed that each family wanted to be able to cherish memories, continue traditions and savor the family unit that they each had been BORN INTO. As we approached our first Thanksgiving holiday, we prayed even harder, asking Jesus to guide us. WHAT TO DO ... WHAT TO DO!!

We decided to keep our family holidays as they were prior to our marriage. We both were the primary "giver" of holiday parties. So we began, and continue to have, 2 Christmas, 2 Thanksgivings and 2 Easter parties. Both families are happy with this arrangement.

Ben's parties often included the Hatfields (Barb's family), his father, mother and later stepmother. Ben's father, mother, stepmother, mother-in-law, and Barb's brother Don, have passed on. Mother Hatfield never missed a get together. Someone would always bring her when

her eyesight failed. The remainder of the Hatfield clan still attend the Thanksgiving party.

My family included my only sibling, my brother Ron, and his family, and my aunt and uncle who I had spent every holiday with since I was a little girl. Their son (my only 1st cousin) would always try to attend. My parents were deceased at this time. My mother had died of cancer just two months before we were married. My Aunt and Uncle Krauss are now deceased. But they drove from Elkhart, Indiana every holiday well into their late 80's to continue to tradition of attending family holiday parties.

This was our "Walk in Faith". Trying to give each individual family the continued love and support they had always enjoyed. Keeping their traditions alive and well, especially for the grandchildren. Two of everything is a lot of work for us, but both of us found it easier to blend into each other's family. We had time to talk and get to know each of them better.

1 Corinthians 14:33 *God is not the author of confusion but of peace.*

When we have "Special Parties" such as retirements, birthdays, etc., we are one BIG family. All of us having fun and enjoying the togetherness.

Being the non-perfect people we all are, I'm sure we have done many things to annoy our children over the years. But they have been kind enough to LET IT GO and allow Ben & I to grow in love for each other and for them, unconditionally, no strings attached!! What success we have had in our relationship, we owe to our children, our in-laws, and our precious grandchildren. They have allowed us to be a big part of all their lives, cherishing old memories and creating new ones. The love of Jesus Christ shines through them, much more than through us.

John 15:12 *This is my commandment, that you love one another, as I have loved you.*

Ben and I have had such great times following our grandchildren from crib to college and beyond. We attend every event they are in if at all possible. This year saw Ben's 1st grandchild, Megan, graduate from Patrick Henry and go on to Ohio State for her first year of college. Go Buckeyes!! His family has added 8 grandchildren to the clan. Mine has added 5 grandchildren, 2 step-grandchildren and 1 great grandchild. We have been so BLESSED!

But life isn't always a walk in the park, and ours is no exception. Ben has had a number of health problems over these years, but none as serious as the Non-Hodgkins Lymphoma cancer that developed in 2002. With many prayers and God's continued healing grace, he has been cancer-free for nine years. Our prayers and our church families' prayers were truly answered.

Mark 11:24 *Whatever things you ask when you pray, believe that you receive them, and you will have them.*

It is said that the Lord doesn't give us more than we can handle. But as so many of us know all too well, sometimes He has more faith in us than we have in ourselves. In May, 2010, my daughter-in-law Teresa broke her ankle in a bicycle accident. The fracture required surgery. A week later three blood clots took her life. This leaves my son, Mike Pauley, raising a 12-year-old daughter and a 10-year-old son.

In September, 2010, Brian Michaelis's 4-year-old son, Kaden (whom you are supporting in prayer) was diagnosed with stage IV Neuroblastoma cancer. He has been in treatment since then and his treatment will continue thru February, 2012. God-willing, he will be cancer-free and will not experience any long-term side effects from the harsh medicines he has been given.

In January, 2011, my other son, Greg Pauley, lost his 28-year-old stepson due to an asthma attack. Tyler died on his 28th birthday. He had suffered

from asthma all his life, but this was totally unexpected.

Our family has had much grief in the last year and a half. Without FAITH in the love of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the knowledge that we are not walking this road alone, how would we survive?

Isaiah 40:11 *He tends his flock like a shepherd: He gathers the lambs in his arms and carries them close to his heart; He gently leads those that have young.*

We are thankful for the blessings that our Lord has given us over the years. We cry for the sorrow our children are enduring. We lend as much help as we can. And at the end of the day, we thank Jesus Christ for being there with us, for cheering us on, and for carrying us when we are too weak and too tired to walk life's path alone.

Psalm 55:22 *Cast your burden on the LORD, and HE shall sustain you.*

CROP Hunger Walk

The 7th Annual Henry County CROP Hunger Walk will take place on Sunday, October 2, at Oakwood Park in Napoleon again this year. What's the point of walking? Hungry people in developing countries typically walk as much as six miles a day to get food, water, and fuel, and to take their goods to market. We walk to be in solidarity with their struggle for existence.

CROP Hunger Walks help fight hunger and poverty around the world, including the United States, and *including here in Henry County*. Up to 25% of what a CROP Hunger Walk raises are returned to be distributed to Christmas Cheer and local food pantries. In the last 20 years, Walks have raised over \$264 million to assist those struggling to feed their families.

Taking place at Oakwood Park, the CROP Walk route is a pleasant 3-mile walk on a leisurely Sunday afternoon. Or you can even do just a 1-mile route if you are limited by time or physical challenges. Registration will begin at 1:30 p.m. with the Walk to start at 2 p.m. You can also help by baking cookies for this.

Northwestern Ohio Synod

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ of the Northwestern Ohio Synod,

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

I write you **to thank you for your support of the 2010 Synodical Annual Appeal and to request your enthusiastic support for the 2011 Synodical Annual Appeal.** Last year members of this Synod contributed \$165,000 to this Appeal over and above Congregational Mission Support. Those funds were used to provide scholarships for children to attend Camp Mowana, Lutheran Memorial Camp, Camp Luther and Lutheran Ohio Ministries in Ohio Outreach Camps. Other funds enabled those preparing to serve as pastors, associates in ministry, and diaconal ministers to receive scholarships through the Fund for Leaders effort. Trinity Seminary received a special gift. Grants were provided to ministries that are embraced by this synod included Salem and Redeemer located in communities of poverty; *Threshold*, a ministry designed to embrace young adults who have little experience of “the church;” Tribe One, our Campus Ministry at the University of Toledo, St. John at the Bay, a ministry with those on South Bass Island. Funds from the Annual Appeal have been used to help put roofs on churches in the Dodoma Diocese, our Companion Synod and to provide seed in Zimbabwe.
