Have you noticed a difference in the taste of the coffee here at church? It is probably because it is now flavored with justice and fair trade! We have become part of the Lutheran World Relief Coffee Project by purchasing our coffee from Equal Exchange in Boston. Through the LWR COFFEE PROJECT, we can enjoy delicious coffee while helping small-scale farmers in Latin American, Africa, and Asia as they build a better future for themselves and their families. Through the project, farmers earn a fair price for their products, have access to affordable credit, and gain a long-term trading partner they can trust, a Fair Trade Organization called Equal Exchange. With our support, these communities invest in education, health care, and agricultural improvements. In addition, for each pound of coffee purchased by Lutheran churches through the project, Equal Exchange makes a contribution to the LWR “Small Farmer Fund” for projects supporting small farmers and their families. Last year Emanuel “adopted” two families in the “PROJECT: We Care” program. This year, we will be adopting five families in this project. There will be Christmas trees at church decorated with “angel tags” which will have the requested item listed on it. Simply Giving Update from the Congregational Life Board

Dear fellow members of Emanuel,

Simply Giving through Thrivent Financial became available to Emanuel as an automated giving program in May of 2004.

Steve and I have chosen *Simply Giving* as our weekly offering way of being consistent with our donation to the church. We have a certain amount drawn out of our checking account each week. That amount is reflected on our monthly checking account statement as a debit. We have split our weekly amount between the General Fund and the Building Fund. We can increase or decrease the amount as we see fit; we can discontinue the program as we see fit. We have chosen to have our donation withdrawn weekly, but you can have it withdrawn semi-monthly, monthly or you can pick the date you want the transaction(s) to occur. This can be done through any bank. And Thrivent will not send you an correspondence to get you to do anything else like buy insurance etc.

We chose the *Simply Giving* program because it is our “regular” way of giving to Emanuel, even if we are not in church to put in our offering envelope each week. We don’t write 52 separate checks every year either! This is a painless way to become good stewards and it is a true way of giving “first fruits” to the church. We know that the church will consistently receive our weekly offering even if we are gone. At first it felt “funny” not putting in a weekly offering envelope, but you can give a separate weekly offering in a different envelope each week to so many other worthy causes like the ELCA World Hunger Appeal, The Gideons, etc. if you feel the need to donate while you are at church. What a great way to help other charitable causes! Also, you can still use your weekly offering envelopes and put them in the offering plate with a *Simply Giving* sticker attached to indicate that is how you donate. But the bottom line is, what and how you give your offering is between you and God. No one else needs to “see” you place your envelope in the offering plate each week.

This is a completely safe way to make your charitable contribution to church through electronic funds transfer. You can sign up anytime to enroll by picking up a brochure at the tables at any entrance, completing the form and placing it in the offering plate or the church office. If you need assistance completing the form, I would be glad to assist you!

Please consider *Simply Giving* as a consistent form of donating to Emanuel.

Do you need Flu vaccine?

Anyone who wants to reduce their chances of getting the flu can get vaccinated. It is recommended that certain people should get vaccinated each year and those people include:

- Those that are at high risk of having serious flu complications
- People who live with or care for those at high risk for serious complications
- Children aged 6-59 months
- Pregnant women
- People 50 years of age and older
- People of any age with certain chronic medical conditions
- People who live in nursing homes and other long term care facilities

October or November is the best time to get vaccinated, but you can still get vaccinated in December and later. Flu season can begin as early as October and last as late as May.

Those that should not be vaccinated include:

- People who have a severe allergy to chicken eggs
- People who have had a severe reaction to a flu vaccine in the past
- People who developed Guillain-Barre syndrome within 6 weeks of getting a flu vaccine previously
- The flu vaccine is not approved for use in children less than 6 months of age
- People who have a moderate or severe illness with a fever should wait to get vaccinated until their symptoms lessen

The viruses in the flu shot are inactivated, so you cannot get the flu from a flu shot. Some minor side effect that could occur are:

- Soreness, redness, or swelling where the shot was given
- Fever (low grade)
- Aches

If these problems occur, they begin soon after the shot and usually last 1 to 2 days.

It is important to remember that it takes about 2 weeks after the vaccination for the antibodies that provide protection against influenza to develop in the body.

Guess Who!

Following tradition, she as a baby was carried about in a cardboard box balanced on someone's head. There were no strollers or baby buggies. The first white baby born in the hospital at Freetown, Sierra Leone, she was a missionary's daughter.

They said she was an international baby: cut her first tooth there, her second in London en route and the rest in United States.

Always active in church groups, she grew to know well and like a youth she met there. Years later he was the one she married.

At Otterbein College she studied music education. Her graduation ceremony closed with the announcement that Germany had surrendered, ending that part of World War II.

Her first year as music teacher in the public schools must have been hectic. At the same time she taught in six public schools. Her favorite was the last of the day where children in a one-room schoolhouse eagerly waited for her.

Eventually her husband decided to become a minister. They raised four children. At her last church, expecting to just sing in the choir she ended up intermittently directing it, the bell choir, and a children's hand chimes class for nineteen years.

In June, 2005 her husband died and she has come here to live with her daughter and son-in-law, Pastor and Carol Castello.
