2nd Annual Henry County CROP Walk

On Sunday, October 1, beginning here at Emanuel at 2 p.m., we will be taking to the streets in the 2nd Annual Henry County CROP Walk. Last year, 32 Walkers from Emanuel were part of the effort that raised \$2,636 - - \$659 of which was returned here to Henry County to be divided among Christmas Cheer and five local food banks in the area.

CROP is an acronym for Communities Responding to Overcome Poverty. CROP events were begun almost 60 years ago, with the collection and shipping of grain contributed by Midwest farmers – central to Church World Service’s work in helping to feed starving people in devastated post-World War II Europe and Asia. Today, CROP Hunger Walks are the only events that raise awareness and funds to address both international and local needs.

This year’s easy 3-mile route in Napoleon will wind across the bridge and down into the southern part of town, with a rest station for restrooms, water and cookies at the Church of the Nazarene. It’s good exercise, good fun, good fellowship, and all for a good cause.

“Injili” means “good news” in Swahili, and it is certainly good news to be able to share this time with our Tanzanian brothers and sisters in Christ. This trip has been two years in the planning, during which time they have studied English and practiced their music and skits to help make our “cultural exchange” more meaningful. Please plan on helping to welcome these guests from the opposite side of the world. Who knows what we all might learn from each other!

Health Ministry

Only 52% have Pneumonia Vaccine!!

From our Henry County Health Assessment which was completed in late 2005, only 52% of our residents who are 65 years old and older population are protected with the pneumonia vaccine! This vaccine has been available in the USA since 1983 and helps prevent bacterial pneumonia illness and deaths. In Henry County residents, an average of 7 persons die every year from influenza and pneumonia. Bacterial pneumonia is often a complication of influenza.

A one-time dose of this vaccine (PPV 23) should be administered routinely to all adults 65 years of age and older. The vaccine should also be given to persons under 65 years old who have a chronic illness such as heart disease, pulmonary (lung) disease, diabetes, alcoholism, cirrhosis or HIV. If under 65 years old, this vaccine should be repeated every 5 years if the above health care conditions still exist. In addition, anyone with the above conditions who have already had pneumonia disease should still receive this vaccine. This vaccine protects you from 23 different types of pneumonia.

If you do not know if you have been given this vaccine, you should call your doctor to see if it is documented on your medical record. Anyone with the above conditions, especially anyone over 65 years old, who is unsure if they have been given this very important vaccine, should seek this vaccine out.

This vaccine is covered under Medicare. The Henry County Health Department offers adult Pneumonia shots without an appointment, Monday through Friday, 1:30 p.m. - 4:00 p.m.

Lutheran World Relief needs:

Sewing Kits

- Three yards of 44" or 45" cotton or a cotton blend fabric; four yards if 36"
- One package of needles for hand sewing
- One spool of matching thread
- One card of buttons

Wrap sewing notions inside fabric and tie with string, yard, or strip of fabric.

Layettes

- Two shirts
- Four cloth diapers
- One bath-size bar of soap
- Two gowns or sleepers
- Two receiving blankets
- One sweater
- Two wash cloths
- Two diaper pins

Wrap items in one of the receiving blankets and secure with diaper pins. Good used items can be substituted for new ones. Sizes up to 24 months may be used. Preferred sweater styles have buttons or ties down the front. Infant sweatshirts may be substituted for the sweater. Bolt of flannel can furnish a number of receiving blankets, diapers, and gowns. A square cut the width of fabric (usually 36" or 45") easily makes a blanket. Diapers can be made by using a pinking shears to cut pieces 22½" wide x 36" long.

Health Kits

- One hand towel
- One washcloth
- One toothbrush
- One tube of toothpaste, 5-7oz.
- One metal nail file, (no nail clippers with file attached)
- One comb, wide tooth preferred
- One bath-size bar of soap
- Six band-aids, preferably ½" - ¾"

Wrap items in the towel, and tie securely with ribbons or yarn.

School Kits

- Pads or notebooks of ruled paper approximately 8½" x 11" containing 150-200 sheets of paper
- One blunt scissors (safety scissors with imbedded steel blades work well)
- One 30-centimeter ruler, or a ruler with centimeters on one side and inches on the other
- One pencil sharpener
- Six new pencils with erasers
- One eraser approximately 2½" long
- 12 sheets of construction paper in assorted colors
- One box of 8, 16, or 24 crayons
- One cloth bag approximately 12" by 14" with cloth handles

Pack items in the bag, fold the handles over, and secure with two large rubber bands or tie with yarn.

Yard Goods Kits

- fabric should be cotton or cotton blend (NO 100% polyester) and cut into pieces: 3 yards of 44" or 45" fabric OR 4 yards of 36" fabric
