For the Northwestern Ohio Synod, this is the Year of Listening. Our daily calendar practices will revolve around so many beloved hymns and other meaningful songs. In this year we will listen to God, listen to ourselves, and listen to each other.

During summer of 2024 I shared work I've done around values both personally and as part of the board of HopeWood Outdoors. I keep revisiting them in this season and wonder if you might join me in that adventure? In the first few months of this year, I would like us to wrestle with our individual values. In the season of Easter, we will compile and share them. Through the summer we will notice where our values overlap and any themes emerging. In the fall we will think about our values as a congregation.

As I shared last summer, values work was never one of my values (haha). It was only in conversation where I began to see how useful it could be. One of the things I love about us as a congregation is how strong our values are—even if we don't

always name them out loud. I think this will be a good opportunity for us to name and celebrate who we are and who God created us to be!

The first step is to spend time with a values list. Put a dot next to any words that stick out to you. Go through the dotted list and put a checkmark next to 10 of the words. Give yourself some time (maybe a week) and live with those words. Which ones are sticking with you? Narrow your list down to 3 or 4. Once you have those, add adjectives to give them some pizzazz and definition! Live with them for a little while and see if they fit!

What are your values, dear ones? I hope we can wrestle with values together in 2025 and beyond! Reach out with questions and look for opportunities to work on values together! Thank you for being you!

HEALTH INFORMATION

Sue Barnes will be available after church on Sunday, January 12, for those who would like to have their blood pressure checked.

As winter sets in, make sure you are prepared for winter weather by planning ahead, getting supplies, and making sure your home is ready. Have you done the following?

- 1. Each winter season have your furnace system and vents checked by a qualified technician to ensure they are functioning properly.
- 2. Install a smoke detector AND a battery-operated carbon monoxide detector near the area to be heated. Test them monthly and replace batteries twice a year.
- 3. If you or a loved one are over 65 years old, place an easy-to-read thermometer in an indoor location where you will see it frequently. Our ability to feel a change in temperature decreases with age. Older adults are more susceptible to health problems caused by cold. Check the temperature of your home often during the winter months.

By doing these simple activities, you rest assured that you are ready for winter weather. Start a puzzle, cook up a batch of homemade soup, start a new hobby, or enjoy some family time with the kids!
