Hi dear ones,

Brad and I just returned from a wonderful vacation in New Orleans. It was weird to be there without our high schoolers and leaders, but we had a great time. One of the highlights of the trip for me was the stop in Biloxi, MS on the way home. It was so cool to be back in a place that changed so much for me.

In the spring of 2006 my parents' congregation (including my dad and brother) made their first trip to Biloxi, MS to clean up after Hurricane Katrina. Little did we know, this would be a huge part of our lives both as a family and as a congregation for years. Dad and Eric shared stories of the man who lived in the house they worked on. He had been through storms before and decided to ride out Katrina. They also brought back a great connection with people in the congregation that we didn't know well before. Most of all, they brought back God-sightings: opportunities to see God in each and every day.

In August, I had my chance to experience Biloxi for myself. Six of us loaded up in an old Astro van and drove the 14 hours to the coast. On our first day we met Josie. She was living in her back yard in a FEMA trailer nearly a year after the storm. She told a story of how her home filled with water and she stood on a chest

freezer. As the water rose higher and higher, she prayed, and the water swirled out the window and left the house. You see, Biloxi was both hit with the 20 foot storm surge and the water in the back bay rose at the same time, flooding everything in between. That week we painted, put a wall where a window was, and cleaned up. She wasn't too far from being able to move back in.

Three months later one van was replaced with five and 6 Ohioans replaced with 20+! We spent thanksgiving week in Biloxi again and this time my whole family was there. I begged my dad to let us go check in on Josie, and he agreed. We discovered there wasn't much left to do to get her moved in. While we weren't technically assigned to Josie's home, a group of us were there each day finishing things up. She asked what we had planned for Thanksgiving and invited us over for a traditional Southern style thanksgiving dinner-gumbo, and soft shell crabs, and fluff fluff cake included! She moved back into her home the day before and the first thing she did was cooked Thanksgiving dinner for a bunch of people she didn't know.

To say it was Holy Ground was an understatement. I knew at that point in my life that my I was called to help people, even if I didn't know exactly what that

looked like. I went to Biloxi a total of 7 times and my parents' congregation made over 25 trips in the following years. It was amazing to be back all these years later and see how much has changed and how much has remained the same. While Josie entered the Church Triumphant over a decade ago, seeing her home again made me feel close to her again.

Thanks for letting me share a bit of my story with you, dear ones. I want to hear your cool God sighting or mountaintop stories too!

Treasurer's Report – Denise Etzler – More money has gone out than been brought in, approximately \$1800. Waiting until Maxine returns soon to get more

specific details. Motion to accept: First -Kelli Burkhardt. Second - Peggy Snyder. Pastor's Report – Pastor Janine Shearer - Our Lenten extras (Accidental Saints book study and Bonhoeffer movie) were both successful! We had great discussions at both events. It sounds like people are interested in doing these sorts of things every few months. If you have ideas for a book study or for a movie day, let me know. The cozy new furniture in the study room was an added benefit! I am a board member for HopeWood Outdoors (LOMO). One of our goals this year especially for HopeWood Pines at LMC is connecting to the town of Fulton. Camp sits next to Fulton's cemetery, which connects to the rest of town. Last year AmeriCorp folks created a trail from camp to Fulton with the hope that more nearby neighbors can connect with God and creation. We were scheduled to have another AmeriCorp crew help this May/June but due to federal funding cuts to AmeriCorp, that is no longer an option. Not only does this make things harder to prepare for the summer, but as we strive to love our neighbors, we grieve for the hundreds of young folks who no longer have employment. Camp has graciously offered them employment opportunities for the season. Our confirmands have prepared their faith statements and are looking forward to being confirmed. Endowment Committee has agreed to honor our request to use \$5000 from the Endowment Fund for missionary support through NW Ohio Synod. Bill Panning is stepping back from leading Dartball. Summer Sunday Coffee Hour begins on June 1 in the Bible Study Room off the overflow area. Coffee Hour "hosts" are assigned by this board but if the assigned date is not workable for you or your group, please let Nantte or Phyllis know ASAP so different arrangements can be made. 

Detailed Instructions will be placed on the stainless steel cart in the kitchen.

Coffee hour "hosts" responsibilities:

- Ask the members of your group to provide the breakfast foods for the Coffee Hour on your particular Sunday. (donuts, bagels, cookies, coffee cake, fresh fruit, pastries; these can be homemade, or store bought)
- Make coffee in the coffee pots in the back room of the kitchen; make 2 pots of regular and 1 pot of decaf; pour the coffee from the glass pots into the appropriately labeled carafes to keep warm.
- There will be a metal cart set up in the kitchen area with plates, napkins, silverware, cups, sugar, sweetener, creamer, stir sticks; a dishwasher utensil basket for used utensils will be on the lower shelf of the cart
- There will be OJ and milk in the kitchen refrigerator. Pour each in a plastic pitcher (found on the metal cart) & bring those up on the cart
- After the Coffee Hour, please wash off the tables in the overflow with the cleaner and paper towels found in the cabinet under the coffee maker in the overflow.
- Take the cart back to the kitchen and wash it off; put *food and milk and juice away as directed below

If you have any *food "leftovers" that you don't want to take home, please put them in the zip lock bags (lower shelf of cart) and place in the either freezer in the room behind the stoves in the kitchen. Perishables such as fruit, juice and milk can be used at Soul Food on the 1st, 3rd, 5th Wednesdays; just leave them in the refrigerator in the kitchen. Please do NOT refrigerate any leftover coffee; it does not get used. Rinse out the coffee carafes and place upside down to dry on the counter by the coffee maker. Put the dirty utensil basket in the dishwasher or wash utensils by hand and leave to dry in the drying rack.
